Agnes Summers sadly passed away on 27th February 2025.


She lived in No 61 until January 2024 when she moved into a care home in Drayton.

Geoff Higgins remembered by Sue Stonier, his friend for more than 45 years



Geoff, with his wife Doreen and son Nicholas, came to Emsworth in 1980 when they bought the Inn on the Quay, having progressed via hotels on the Isle of Wight and the New Forest. Doreen was a very good cook and chose her chefs carefully. She and Geoff both paid great attention to detail and the Inn rapidly became very popular, which resulted in their making many long-lasting friendships with their regular customers.

Living over the Inn was cramped and after visiting No.55 for frequent wine tastings, or trying out a new recipe, they were attracted to the estate and bought No.31 in 1984, which remained the family home thereafter.

Doreen missed having guests to stay at the business so in 1985 they sold the Inn and bought Newtown House Hotel on Hayling Island. Then via a wildly successful French restaurant in Shere, Surrey, they moved to a sea-front hotel at Worthing, but all the time popping back to Maisemore whenever business allowed.

Doreen became ill and died in 1993. As their businesses were always a partnership of skills, without her Geoff could not, nor wanted to, continue, so he sold up and came home to Emsworth.

Having done accounts all his working life, he soon found himself needed. He did the accounts for a fish and chip shop, was for a while treasurer of MGL, and in 2000 took over as treasurer for the Museum, which he did for 16 years before a suitable replacement volunteered.

His knowledge of wines was useful, when at first he worked parttime in the wine shop at Westbourne, until a friend with a chain of motor-factors asked him to help part-time at his warehouse in Alton.

Geoff had many interests - food, wine, railways, family history research, playing cards, dancing and crossword puzzles - and DIY skills which he'd honed at all the various properties he'd lived in, including two French houses. With his warm, easy-going nature, always considerate, never selfish, he mopped up friends wherever he went and many of these interests overlapped.

He went away as often as he could - a few days on trains with another railway buff, a short organised trip with the museum to somewhere interesting, a tour in the car to research family history at some far-flung Record Offices, or a week or so in Spain or Italy with kind friends at their houses, not to mention going with Nick to his own house in France to patch it up some more. Latterly the oedema in his legs curtailed these and, while he continued to pursue his Family History project, he began to feel like 'a prisoner in his own home'. With ever failing health he was no longer able to cope at home, and so moved into white Lodge where he died a few weeks later, just after his 90th birthday.
